I'm a former Recreational Leader of the New Lisbon Correctional Institution and I have to say that I am SO thankful for the 9 months I got to spend in prison. I would have never understood the need for prison reform if it wasn't for my experience.

When I was hired at N.L.C.I., I came in with the understanding that my position was to help rehabilitate the men to become successful citizens of society. I encouraged them to put the work in during their time, so they would have the tools to thrive in their freedom. Well, administration did not like that. The administration was threatened by the joy and empowerment that I brought to Recreation. They didn't like that the men were choosing healthy outlets, they didn't like that the countenance of the general population was lifting, they didn't like that the men were excited to be treated with humanity rather than unimportant scum. My time in prison was cut short because of the administration feeling threatened by the atmosphere I brought to the dark institution. Light is not wanted within those walls and that is something I believe needs to change.

After 40 days of unpaid administrative leave, I was terminated on Friday, December 13th 2019 for "not passing probationary standards". It didn't matter that all the programming I had added and built upon was changing the atmosphere in the institution for the better. They needed a scapegoat to get rid of me, and "not passing probationary standards" was it. Friday, December 13th was a day of sadness but also a day of resolution. As I drove away from N.L.C.I., no longer employed by the DOC, I made a pivotal decision to write Marshall Jones.

Marshall Jones was one of four inmate workers that assisted me in my Rec Leader position. He lead fitness classes, reffed all competitive events, assisted setting up Rec events, helped encourage men that came to Recreation, and counseled the men to prepare for their release. Marshall's conduct spoke for itself and I could see he was a man of his word by the actions displayed. He worked hard in Rec and Marshall worked even harder doing his time by becoming a published author of his first book, "A Raven's Meal". While working with Marshall, I learned he was serving a double life sentence, and I was shocked he would be there for the rest of his life. The reason I was shocked was because Marshall lived more free within the walls of that prison than any other person I've met in my life. How is that possible? It was possible because of the faith he so boldly lives. Marshall was incarcerated at 21 years old and has served 17 years of his sentence. When I drove away from N.L.C.I. I decided I wanted Marshall to know that he was remembered by someone. I wanted him to know he made an impact on my life by living the way he did within the walls of prison. I wanted him to know that despite the circumstances, I wanted to extend the olive branch of becoming his friend. Writing Marshall Jones was one of the best choices I have ever made in my life.

I believe so many men like Marshall are deserving of a second chance. This is something I wouldn't have ever understood if I didn't have my time in prison, working closely with the general population. There is a deep need for prison reform and Marshall is the perfect story of a cast away finding redemption. I know how many second chances I have had. I believe it's time for those who have proven rehabilitation exists, get their second chance. To make evident their efforts aren't for nothing.

WHY KJV (King James Version)

"Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Timothy 2:15

This is one of my favorite Bible verses, a constant source of encouragement for me to dig deeper and deeper into the Word of God to receive truth in its deepest form. I believe it is our job as believers to study as deep as we can, and then build our way up. The King James Version of the Bible is one of most popular early translations of the Bible to English, so that is where my study begins. I have come to learn that by putting the King James Version side by side with other translations that may be easier to read, that easier doesn't always keep the deeper meaning intact. The "thee", "thy", and "ye" can be a little overwhelming at first, but as with anything else we study continuously, it will become easier to decipher.

The Bible I use, the KJV AMG Hebrew-Greek Keyword Study Bible, gives me an enormous tool to not only study the Word of God from an earlier English translation, but gives me access to study the keywords in the Scripture to find the deeper meaning of the verses I study. The more I studied the Word of God, the deeper I wanted to go. When I first started my incarceration over 17 years ago, I read the NIV version of the Bible. As I matured as a reader, I went back to the King James Version in 2007, wanting to learn the most difficult English translation. I went to the Hebrew-Greek Keyword Study Bible in 2014 and have been using it since. I recently was given a MacArthur Study Bible, NASB, which I use for scriptural cross-references and commentary purposes. I am in no way saying it is wrong for anyone to study any translation other than the King James Version, but I do suggest that everyone possesses one, so we can break down the Word of Truth side by side. It is important to go to the earliest possible translation, to see the modernized translations accurately convey the Word of God.

Studying the Word of God pleases Him, and I desire to break down the Scriptures rightly, understanding that by studying the Word of God, I am breaking down truth so I can position myself for the Holy Spirit's teaching. Whatever I learn, I then share, and by sheer repetition, I am able to retain what I learn better.

May the study of God's Word release amazing truths and powerful revelations in your lives.

1. Psalm 112:1 – Godly reverence leading to Godly praise

Do we praise the Lord for who He is, and what He has already done in our lives?

Praise is especially important in our faith, as it puts everything in proper perspective. God created the world and set the things in motion that make our lives so full and complete.

Praise is acknowledging God as the sole provider of every good and perfect thing, and is also a statement of faith, giving God glory for what is to come. Praise puts us in a position of worship, the depressing of ourselves, and the magnifying of God.

We praise God out of reverence for Him, obedience to His Word, and for being able to draw near to Him and His Word.

There is no obedience or praise without reverence, and as believers we must begin and end our faith with reverence for the Lord God.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:1, Godly reverence leading to Godly praise.

"Praise ye the LORD. Blessed is the man that feareth the LORD, that delighteth greatly in his commandments."

The word "praise" means "to shine, to make a boast about, to rave, to celebrate, to glory in, or to commend".

Do we do any of this in our faith walks? If we do praise God, do we only praise Him when everything is going well?

In Psalm 34:1-3, the Bible says, ***"I will bless the LORD at all times: his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul shall make her boast in the LORD: the humble shall hear thereof, and be glad. O magnify the LORD with me, and let us exalt his name together."*** We must bless the Lord at ALL times, not some of the time, or when God puts a huge smile on our faces by what He is doing.

God doesn't want "part-time" praise and worshippers any more than we want a part-time God.

In Psalm 111:1, the Bible says, ***"Praise ye the LORD. I will praise the LORD with my whole heart, in the assembly of the upright, and in the congregation."*** Our praise must be from our whole heart, with sincerity and truth. Sometimes, especially when afflicted, we like to withhold praise, but that is the perfect time to praise God.

In Psalm 34:4-5, the Bible says, ***"I sought the LORD, and he heard me, and delivered me from all my fears. They looked unto him, and were lightened: and their faces were not ashamed."*** Only after David praised God with his mouth, boasting in the Lord, magnifying the Lord, did God bring the answer of deliverance. Many of us wonder why God doesn't appear to be listening to our prayers, but is God hearing our praise?

In Psalm 150:6, the Bible says, ***"Let every thing that hath breath praise the LORD. Praise ye the LORD."*** Every thing that has breath, including us.

The word "blessed" means "how happy", signifying a state of bliss we have due to having a relationship with God. The word "feareth" means "reverence or Godly respect".

In Psalm 128:1-2, the Bible says, **"Blessed is every one that feareth the LORD; that walketh in his ways. For thou shalt eat the labour of thine hands: happy shalt thou be, and it shall be well with thee."** When we praise the Lord and have Godly reverence for Him, He responds by bringing us into a state of bliss and provision. Many of us wonder why our wells are going dry, but we must ask ourselves, are we praising God? Do we reverence the Lord and live according to his will? If we won't heed the Word of the Lord, then how can we expect to experience the hand of God?

In John 15:7, Christ says, **"If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you."** If we won't come into the unity and oneness with Him, we shouldn't then wonder why we don't live blessed lives. Our blessings don't come by material possessions, but because we understand that God is the Creator and Orchestrator of everything in our lives as believers.

The word "delighteth" means "to incline towards, to bend towards, to be pleased with." In Psalm 119:15-16, the Bible says, **"I will meditate in thy precepts, and have respect unto thy ways. I will delight myself in thy statutes: I will not forget thy word."** When we allow the Word of God to be planted so it can grow within us, it will produce the attitude, reverence and praise we need for God's presence to manifest in our lives.

The word "commandments" means "laws, ordinance, precepts, or instruction". In Psalm 119:34-36 the Bible says, **"Give me understanding, and I shall keep thy law; yea, I shall observe it with my whole heart. Make me to go in the path of thy commandments; for therein do I delight. Incline my heart unto thy testimonies, and not to covetousness."** We must seek the Lord for the path to come into subjection to His Word, and draw our focus to Him instead of the world and what it has.

God has everything we need, but if we don't praise Him for who He is, for who He allows us to be, and for the work He has already done in our lives, then how can we expect Him to respond to what we need now?

2. Psalm 112:2 - leaving a mighty legacy behind for our seeds

In the world, a lot is spoken of leaving legacies behind for our children and the people that will come behind us. We want our work here on earth to mean something after we leave this earthly home to go to glory, and we want our seed to continue in the power that we walked in while on earth.

Prosperous people leave an inheritance behind, so that the world will be a little less harsh for the ones coming behind them. In order for an inheritance to be left, we have to live our lives here on earth building one.

The world leaves a mantle of material possession; money, cars, jewelry, businesses, stock, and investments, but none of that makes one prosperous without Christ as their Lord and Savior.

What mantle will we leave our children, Word or world?

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:2, leaving a mighty legacy behind for our seeds.

"His seed shall be mighty upon earth: the generation of the upright shall be blessed."

The word "seed" means "child, posterity, or fruit". The word "mighty" means "powerful or strong".

In Psalm 25:12-13, the Bible says, **"What man is he that feareth the LORD? him shall he teach in the way that he shall choose. His soul shall dwell at ease; and his seed shall inherit the earth."**

With deep reverence and respect for God, we are then available to Him to teach us His Word and His will for our lives.

Many people want ease of life and comfort for their seed, but are not willing to completely submit themselves to the Lord.

In Genesis 22:17-18, the Bible says, **"That in blessing I will bless thee, and in multiplying I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore; and thy seed shall possess the gate of his enemies; And in thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice."**

God promised Abraham that He would not only bless him, but He would multiply his seed as well, and his seed would be the blessing for all the nations on the earth. There was a reason why God gave Abraham this promise;

... Abraham had obeyed the voice of God. There were 42 generations from Abraham to Christ, and David and Solomon were in that lineage! God kept His Word!

In 2 Samuel 7:12-13, the Bible says, **"And when thy days be fulfilled, and thou shalt sleep with thy fathers, I will set up thy seed after thee, which shall proceed out of thy bowels, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build an house for my name, and I will stablish the throne of his kingdom for ever."**

David wanted to build a house for God, but God wouldn't allow him to do it. God promised David that his seed will build the Lord's house when David died, and promised to establish his throne forever! We know this is true because 2 Peter 1:11 says, **"For so an entrance shall be ministered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."** Christ's kingdom has no end and this is confirmation of the Word of God being truth.

In Psalm 37:25-26, the Bible says, **"I have been young, and now am old; yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread. He is ever merciful, and lendeth; and his seed is blessed."** We must recall the goodness of God, how He has kept us, and never left us, how He has shown us great mercy, and bestowed so many blessings upon us.

In Ephesians 1:3, the Bible says, **"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ"**. Because of Christ's everlasting kingdom, we have been blessed with EVERY spiritual blessing in heaven and access to the very kingdom that we are children of.

The word "generation" implies an age or revolution of time from birth to death. The word "upright" means "straight, just, or righteous". The word "bless" implies God bestowing a benefit upon us and wanting us to know it comes directly from Him, and no one else.

In 2 Kings 2:14-15, the Bible says, **"And he took the mantle of Elijah that fell from him, and smote the waters, and said, Where is the LORD God of Elijah? and when he also had smitten the waters, they parted hither and thither: and Elisha went over. And when the sons of the prophets which were to view at Jericho saw him, they said, The spirit of Elijah doth rest on Elisha. And they came to meet him, and bowed themselves to the ground before him."** Elijah was Elisha's spiritual father on earth, and he left behind his mantle, the power of God that He walked in. Elisha took up the mantle and operated in the same power of God !

This is what we should be most focused on leaving behind when we leave the earth; the Word of God at work in the lives of our seed, establishing that no generation will go without salvation and resurrection power! Our seed will never be mighty in the earth without a relationship with the Lord God.

3. Psalm 112:3 - true wealth and riches in Christ

We live in a world where wealth accumulation is sought after more fervently than anything. We have more millionaire and billionaire men and women than at any point in our history, but has that been the answer to the problems the world faces?

Are we any closer to God as a people in the midst of all of this immense wealth? Are the wealthy any happier?

Maybe, we have been looking at the wrong things when it comes to wealth, and have lost sight of the fact that our true wealth comes from our salvation, from our relationship in God, and from the Holy Spirit dwelling in us.

In a believer's life, we have access to the kingdom of God, and we have unlimited access to our Father in heaven, through the Holy Spirit.

We have the privilege to live as children of God and be co-heirs with Christ.

We as believers understand that without God, there is no real wealth, just a bunch of material possessions that would never fulfill us.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:3, true wealth and riches in Christ.

"Wealth and riches shall be in his house: and his righteousness endureth for ever."

The word "wealth" means "enough substance". The word "riches" means "wealth". The word "house" pertains to one's household or family.

In Proverbs 3:13-15, the Bible says, ***"Happy is the man that findeth wisdom, and the man that getteth understanding. For the merchandise of it is better than the merchandise of silver, and the gain thereof than fine gold. She is more precious than rubies: and all the things thou canst desire are not to be compared unto her."***

Wait a minute, so there is something on earth that is more valuable than monetary wealth and riches? Wisdom and understanding are more valuable than all the money in the world. We haven't gotten to salvation, eternal life, and walking in the power of the Holy Spirit, and there are still things in this earth that are more valuable than the wealth and riches the world runs after??!!

In Proverbs 9:10, the Bible says, ***"The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding."*** Wisdom comes from the fear of the Lord, and understanding is when we "know", or become one with holiness. That doesn't cost us anything, but it is extremely valuable and can be shared everywhere we go.

In 1 Kings 3:9, after God appeared to Solomon in a dream and asked Solomon to ask Him for anything and it will be given, the Bible says that Solomon replied, ***"Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and bad: for who is able to judge this thy so great a people?"*** Solomon could've asked for anything and would have gotten it, but he only asked for the understanding and discernment to be king the way God wanted him to be.

In 1 Kings 3:10, the Bible says, ***"And the speech pleased the LORD, that Solomon had asked this thing."*** Solomon pleased the Lord when he asked for wisdom instead of financial wealth, and to show how pleased God was with Solomon, 1 Kings 3:12-13, the Bible says, ***"Behold, I have done according to thy words: lo, I have given thee a wise and an understanding heart; so that there was none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee. And I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches, and honour: so that there shall not be any among the kings like unto thee all***

thy days." God gave Solomon what he asked for, and also gave him what he wasn't concerned with, riches, and gave it so there would be no one that could ever compare to him on the earth!

Forget what Solomon became for a minute, and what he received from God. All of this happened in a dream, so even in Solomon's sleep, his mind was on pleasing the Lord! What type of a dollar amount can any of us place on an answered prayer?

The word "righteousness" means "blameless conduct, integrity, virtue, or justice". The phrase "endureth forever" means "to last in perpetuity".

In 1 Timothy 6:5-6, the Bible says, "**Perverse disputings of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the truth, supposing that gain is godliness: from such withdraw thyself. But godliness with contentment is great gain.**" Godliness is the goal for believers, to live as God created us; to bear His image and likeness in the earth. Godliness with contentment doesn't cost us anything, but it is "great gain".

In Matthew 6:33, Christ says, "**But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.**"

When the Bible mentions the word "first" it is the most valuable part, the part that is set apart for God.

When we seek the kingdom of God first, pursue it, and bring ourselves under subjection to the Holy Spirit in Jesus' Name, the things we need will be provided. True wealth and riches are available to those who abide in the Lord and pursue his righteousness.

4. Psalm 112:4 - prosperous in the light of the Lord

As believers, we have the privilege to walk in the light of the Lord, living according to the Word of truth. So many people find themselves living defeated lives because they can't see what is there, lurking in the darkness, ready to strike.

Godly prosperity requires us as believers to see where we are going and to do that we must see the way.

If our attitude is right before the Lord, it will not only shine a light on our path, but also on our lives.

Truly prosperous people open the door for others to receive some of what God has given them, and as God shines His light on them, His light and love will shine on to others.

There are character traits of those who walk in the light and live in Godly prosperity, traits of grace, compassion, and righteousness.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:4, prosperous in the light of the Lord.

"Unto the upright there ariseth light in the darkness: he is gracious, and full of compassion, and righteous."

The word "upright" means "straight, just, or righteous".

In 2 Corinthians 5:21, the Bible says, **"For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."** It is because of Christ, and the blood He shed for our sin that we have access to be made the righteousness of God.

Our standing with God is because of the finished work of Christ, not because of anything we can do on our own. When we understand that our wealth in the kingdom of God begins with our faith in the blood of Jesus Christ, then we will look to Him instead of looking for things outside of our faith as the source of our prosperity.

In Proverbs 18:10, the Bible says, **"The name of the LORD is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe."** A prosperous person is secure spiritually, knowing in whom is their refuge, habitation, trust. There are exceptions to every rule, but by and large, a "homeless" person will have the hardest time becoming prosperous because they have no place to turn, and no place to stay that gives them the security to build true wealth.

The word "arise" means "to irradiate or shoot forth beams". The word "light" means "a luminary", also speaking of one experiencing good fortune in the Lord. The word "darkness" means "misery, destruction, sorrow, wickedness, or disorder".

The person who walks in darkness can't see beyond their poor spiritual state.

In Psalm 119:105, the Bible says, **"Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path."** Spiritually prosperous people have their paths lit by the Word of God, and their lives are patterned according to the Word of God. Money does not make a person prosperous any more than good works produce salvation.

In 1 John 1:7, the Bible says, **"But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin."** Walking in the light of the Lord, we will come into union with people through love, and in experiencing cleansing from all things that can hinder our victory in Him.

In Matthew 5:15-16, Christ says, **"Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."** When God shines His light upon us, we project His light in the earth. This isn't done to make us appear better than anyone, but so we can live a Godly life and point the way to Christ, giving glory to God.

"He is gracious, and full of compassion, and righteous"

The word "gracious" means "merciful, willing to show favor to". The word "compassion" means "lovingkindness, or affection". The word "righteous" means "just, due to conformity to the standard of God."

In Romans 12:2, the Bible says, **"And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."** When we conform to the standard of God, our minds are in a constant state of renewal, and we will know the will of God for our lives.

In John 1:14, the Bible says, **"And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth."** Christ came to this world full of grace and truth, and because the power of Christ dwells inside us, we have access to the His fullness of grace and truth.

1 John 4:17 says, **"Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as HE IS, SO ARE WE in this world."** True Godly prosperity is living as Christ did on earth; in light, in righteousness, in grace, in truth and in love!

There is no greater prosperity as believers!

5. Psalm 112:5 – a diligent steward with the provision of God

The Lord God gives believers more than they generally ask and more than they need.

In the world we live in, society lives with a different mindset that never has enough.

We live in a society that is Godless, stingy, and impulsive, and the world is becoming more divided as the days pass.

Believers should be setting the standard in earth, in what is said, in the messages we live by and the work we do.

Believers should bless others with the blessings they receive from God, and use the wisdom He gives to make sound decisions.

Prosperous people should manage their affairs well and give some of what they have to ensure others can also live with the spiritual advantage that the Lord has given them, assisting those others in becoming who God created them to be.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:5, a diligent steward with the provision of God.

"A good man sheweth favour, and lendeth: he will guide his affairs with discretion."

The word "good" means "well-pleasing, morally correct, prosperous, or fruitful".

To understand the word "good", we have to go back to the beginning, to the first use of the word "good" in the Bible.

In Genesis 1:3-4, the Bible says, ***"And God said, Let there be light: and there was light. And God saw the light, that it was good: and God divided the light from the darkness."*** God spoke light into existence, and when it became what He created it to be, He called it "good".

So a "good person" is one who is being exactly who God created them to be, and as God beholds His work in us, He will declare it "good". The problem with society is that it wants to do good things and thinks that doing good is enough. We are living in complete disobedience to the will of God if we are not being who God created us to be.

In Psalm 37:23-24, the Bible says, ***"The steps of a good man are ordered by the LORD: and he delighteth in his way. Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down: for the LORD upholdeth him with his hand."***

When we abandon our plans, ambitions, and thinking, and allow God to direct us as He wills, we will come into conformity with His Word, His will and His standards. Many people in this world try to attain wealth absent of a relationship with God and absent His direction - they will always have a void that ONLY God can fill.

In Matthew 25:20-21, Christ says, ***"And so he that had received five talents came and brought other five talents, saying, Lord, thou deliveredst unto me five talents: behold, I have gained beside them five talents more. His lord said unto him, Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord."*** The person who is good takes what God ordains and has bestowed on them, and increases it in the earth.

Don't we want God to declare us as "good and faithful", that will show that we have lived according to His creative design for each of us?

The phrase "sheweth favour" means "to bend or stoop in kindness to someone inferior or of low estate." The word "lendeth" means "to borrow, to join oneself to, to unite with".

In Romans 12:16, the Bible says, **"Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits."** When we look at those in need, we should not look at them as lower than we are. This world typically looks down on those who have fallen upon hard times, those who are homeless, poor, in prison, or battling mental health issues.

God wants us to identify with others right where they are, not place our standards upon them.

If we will see people as equals, then we will want them to rise out of the pits of misfortune they find themselves in.

In Psalm 37:26, the Bible says, **"He is ever merciful, and lendeth; and his seed is blessed."**

We must look at people in need with mercy.

The word "guide" means "nourish, maintain, or sustain". The word "affairs" means "speech and deeds". The word "discretion" means "judgements made in wisdom".

In Colossians 4:5-6, the Bible says, **"Walk in wisdom toward them that are without, redeeming the time. Let your speech be always with grace, seasoned with salt, that ye may know how ye ought to answer every man."** Truly prosperous people will manage their mouths, their message, and their actions according to the Word of God. Then they will become a people build upon the foundation of Christ.

In Ephesians 5:17, the Bible says, **"Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is"**. The person who is good will always inquire about the will of God for all others they encounter, so they can live out His will.

A prosperous person will be living out God's intended design in their lives.

6. Psalm 112:6 - an unshakable legacy in Christ Jesus

As believers, we have a sure place to place our feet, a foundation in Jesus Christ, where as long as our lives are built upon Christ's foundation, we won't be shaken.

Many people envy the wealthy because they have the appearance of security. They don't seem to have the worries that "regular people" have, and that is attractive in a world becoming more superficial by the second.

The wealthy have wills and a financial legacy to leave to children and family, but without a sure foundation in Christ, the most important legacy to leave behind is cast away like trash.

Most people don't understand that a building will not stand without a sure foundation, and a Godly prosperous person will not stand without Christ being their standard.

Without Christ, anything coming our way can blow us in whatever direction the wind takes, and there is no security in that.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:6, an unshakable legacy in Christ Jesus.

"Surely he shall not be moved for ever: the righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance."

The word "moved" means "to shake, to waver, to fall into decay".

In order for us to not be moved, we must rest in a sure foundation.

In Matthew 7:24-25, Christ says, ***"Therefore whosoever heareth these sayings of mine, and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock: And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and beat upon that house; and it fell not: for it was founded upon a rock."*** People think money makes for a sure foundation, but it doesn't. Monetary wealth and spiritual stability are two different things.

The Scripture in Matthew says clearly that the person who hears the Word of God and lives it has a foundation on the Rock, which is Christ. That person doesn't crumble with pressure, adversity or when storms come, as the Word of God keeps them grounded, unable to be shaken.

In 2 Timothy 2:19, the Bible says, ***"Nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, The Lord knoweth them that are his. And, Let every one that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity."*** When we are rooted in Christ, we have an identity and an authority in Him, and the capability to not serve the iniquity that put us in bondage. Too many people in life try to build their lives on power and money, thinking that this wealth will solve all of their problems.

Imagine when they realize that the fortune they have amassed isn't what they truly needed, and that someone actually died on the cross to ensure they didn't have to pay THE DEBT their money could never afford?

In 1 Corinthians 15:58, the Bible says, ***"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."*** When we are rooted in the Lord, we don't waver. It doesn't say that we are "always abounding in money", but it says "always abounding in the work of the Lord."

The person rooted in the Lord is living their life to please God, and doing things that God is calling them to do. The person prosperous in the Lord is led by the Word of God, is laboring in love, and edifying the body of Christ with what the Lord provides.

In Hebrews 12:28, the Bible says, ***"Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear"***.

When we receive the kingdom of God, we receive a stability that the world could never give, because the kingdom of God is the surest foundation we have. Living on that solid foundation, God gives us grace and the ability to serve Him on His terms.

The word "righteous" means "just, lawful, someone who brings themselves under conformity to the standard of God." The phrase "everlasting remembrance" means "to be memorialized or to serve as a momento." This is the legacy we want to leave behind, one of Godliness, obedience, and service.

In Proverbs 10:7, the Bible says, ***"The memory of the just is blessed: but the name of the wicked shall rot."*** We want the legacy we have to be blessed because we want people to be blessed by our lives in the Lord.

In 2 Samuel 7:16, the Bible says, **"And thine house and thy kingdom shall be established for ever before thee: thy throne shall be established for ever."** David had a legacy that we still talk about to this day.

In Acts 13:22, the Bible says, **"And when he had removed him, he raised up unto them David to be their king; to whom also he gave their testimony, and said, I have found David the son of Jesse, a man after mine own heart, which shall fulfil all my will."** Thousands of years after David's death, Paul was preaching about Him!

David will forever be known as the man after God's own heart.

What will we be known for? What will be our crowning achievement, faith in God or money?

7. Psalm 112:7 - a steadfast heart in the Lord

The wealthy in the world have security. They have state of the art security systems, panic rooms, safes in their homes the size of small New York apartments, and some have bodyguards too. Every one of the security measures the wealthy take are constructed by imperfect people, and are equipped with points of vulnerability. Even amid security, the wealthy in the world are afraid of losing everything they have.

As wealthy in the Lord we don't have the fear the world has, because our hearts are set on the Lord.

Our security is in the Word of God, our protection is under His wings, our ears are attuned to His Word.

When bad news comes, when adverse reports come our way, we can rest in the Lord, and take refuge in His presence.

It is in Him that we establish our lives, our hearts, and our thoughts, and watch our lives transform in amazing ways.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:7, a steadfast heart in the Lord.

"He shall not be afraid of evil tidings: his heart is fixed, trusting in the LORD."

The word "afraid" means "to be frightened". The phrase "evil tidings" means "a bad, adverse, hurtful or harmful report".

In Isaiah 54:17, the Bible says, **"No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn. This is the heritage of the servants of the LORD, and their righteousness is of me, saith the LORD."** When our righteousness is of the Lord, we live with a heritage, or inheritance, that came through the blood of Jesus Christ, so that God's Word for us as believers is the only thing we can hold any weight in.

If the enemy tries to wage war against us to get us to question our identity in Christ, or if mankind tries to speak ill of us, we don't have to agree with their report.

In 2 Corinthians, 10:4-5, the Bible says, **"(For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;) Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ"**. People who are prosperous in Godliness do not allow evil reports to weigh down their thoughts, nor entertain thoughts that are contrary to the Word of God. Our weaponry is spiritual, our sword is the Word of God, and that is the tool by which we understand our standard in the Lord, and also by which we learn to apply that standard.

In Proverbs 1:33, the Bible says, **"But whoso hearkeneth unto me shall dwell safely, and shall be quiet from fear of evil."** What voices are we hearing, theirs, our own, or the Lord's? There is safety when the report of the Lord is what we receive. Godly prosperous people are very careful what they listen to. Evil reports can come from anywhere and from anyone, especially in the age of social media, but Godly prosperous people keep their ears attuned to the Lord and to what is edifying, pleasing, or profitable.

The word "heart" refers to the center of one's being, or the seat of mankind's inner nature. This is the deepest place within us.

In Proverbs 4:23, the Bible says, **"Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life."**

Those prosperous in the Lord, allow God to guard their minds and hearts, knowing that is where our successes and failures are conceived.

The word "fixed" means "to make firm, establish, prepare, or build up". The word "trusting" means "to hie for refuge", implying a safety and security believers have when we rely on the Lord. The word "hie" implies that we instinctively run towards the Lord for safety when we are afflicted.

What do we do when we get an evil report spoken against us? Some of us retaliate with our own report, some of us believe the evil report, and some of us try to defend ourselves against the evil report.

But what are we supposed to do?

When King Hezekiah received an evil report from Rabshakeh that Assyria was going to come and invade their land and completely subdue it, Isaiah 37:14-15 says, **"And Hezekiah received the letter from the hand of the messengers, and read it: and Hezekiah went up unto the house of the LORD, and spread it before the LORD. And Hezekiah prayed unto the LORD, saying,"**

Hezekiah did the wise thing, he spread the evil report before the Lord, and prayed to God for help.

The worldly will bring their evil report to their accountant, their lawyer, or someone they feel can handle it, but believers bring their reports to the Lord because God is our refuge.

In Psalm 57:1, the Bible says, **"Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me: for my soul trusteth in thee: yea, in the shadow of thy wings will I make my refuge, until these calamities be overpast."**

When we are done praying, we take refuge in the Lord, and let Him handle the evil report.

8. Psalm 112:8 - a heart established for victory

There's an expectation of adversity that comes with success, and that adversity comes in many forms.

It happens with prosperous people in the world, and it happens even more with prosperous people in the Word of God.

Believers have an adversary, the devil, who tries to direct us away from the Word of God, who tries to attack us in order to destroy our faith.

With success, you are going to have haters, but we need to know that it is not them, but the spirits that are at work in them.

When our heart is established before the Lord, we will pray for our adversaries and then watch their offensives against us fail. When they do fail, we can smile, looking at our Lord, who provided the safe place for us to experience victory in Him.

As long as our hearts are fixed on the Lord, we will always stand in victory when the smoke clears.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:8, a heart established for victory.

"His heart is established, he shall not be afraid, until he see his desire upon his enemies."

The word "heart" speaks of the center of one's being, or the seat of one's inner nature. This is where the Word of God gets planted to guard our emotions from anything that is contrary to the Word of God.

In Psalm 119:11, the Bible says, ***"Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee."*** When we plant the Word of God in our hearts, it becomes the governor of our actions. A person who prospers spiritually is the person who stores the Word of God into their mind and heart in order to live it out.

Whatever is dominant inside us will rise to the surface.

In Matthew 12:34-35, Christ says, ***"O generation of vipers, how can ye, being evil, speak good things? for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh. A good man out of the good treasure of the heart bringeth forth good things: and an evil man out of the evil treasure bringeth forth evil things."*** What we put in our hearts becomes treasure, whether it be good treasure or bad, and it will flow through our speech. We must be so careful to watch what we place within, because that can either poison us or give us power.

What we place in our hearts becomes a standard within us, but we want to live according to the right standard.

The word "established" means "upheld, propped against something or someone solid, or at rest". This implies a state of peace we have access to as believers.

In Hebrews 13:9, the Bible says, ***"Be not carried about with divers and strange doctrines. For it is a good thing that the heart be established with grace; not with meats, which have not profited them that have been occupied therein."*** We want our hearts established with grace because that is the same thing Christ is full of.

Grace is divine empowerment, a bridge between what we can do on our own and what we will do in Christ.

In Colossians 3:1-2, the Bible says, ***"If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth."*** When our hearts are established,

our perspective changes. People who are prosperous in the Lord are those whose mind remains on the Lord for instruction, correction, direction, and perspective.

We want to live the same way Christ did while on earth, so we have to set a guard over our minds and hearts.

The word "afraid" means "to be terrified or frightened".

In Psalm 27:1, the Bible says, "**The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? the LORD is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?**" There is nothing to be afraid of when we have the Lord as our light and salvation.

What can the enemy do when we see the path for our feet and know that our salvation restores the authority we have in the earth? What can the enemy do when the Lord IS our strength?

Perspective: We must see things clearly if we are ever to prosper in the manner that God ordains for us.

The phrase "see his desire" means "looks upon with satisfaction, from a place of victory. The word "enemies" means "opponent, foe, or an adversary."

In Psalm 91:7-8, the Bible says, "**A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand; but it shall not come nigh thee. Only with thine eyes shalt thou behold and see the reward of the wicked.**" It doesn't matter who drops around us, or who loses their battle, because we are in the Lord, we will watch our enemies be defeated. We will see their reports come to nought. We will watch them be confounded that their attacks didn't work!

In Psalm 59:9-10, the Bible says "**Because of his strength will I wait upon thee: for God is my defence. The God of my mercy shall prevent me: God shall let me see my desire upon mine enemies.**"

Spiritually prosperous people don't fight enemies on their own. They turn to the Lord for victory!

9. Psalm 112:9 - the generosity of the prosperous in the Lord

People who are prosperous in the Lord are the biggest givers.

If we are to be who Christ is in the earth, we must do what He did.

We never read in the Bible that Christ churned out millionaires when He ministered in the earth, or gave astronomical amounts of money to the people in need.

What did He do? He saw spiritual poverty and healed it.

Christ had the power of God and shared it fully with all who believed, and when His ministry was complete in the earth, He gave Himself to being the atoning sacrifice for sin.

The more God gives us, the more willing we should be to give what we have to others. It is a sign of spiritual strength when we give, because it shows that we trust that God will continue to provide for us. When we use our abundance to bless others God will shine His light upon us in approval.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:9, the generosity of the prosperous in the Lord.

"He hath dispersed, he hath given to the poor; his righteousness endureth for ever; his horn shall be exalted with honour."

The word "dispersed" means "to scatter bounty abroad". The word "given" means "to borrow or distribute". The word "poor" means "someone destitute, a beggar, or someone needy". So we have a mission and people to reach on that mission, but will we do it?

In Luke 6:38, Christ says, **"Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again."** The reason many of us operate on a spiritual and even a financial deficit is because we are stingy with what we have been given by God. We get what we give.

In 2 Corinthians 9:6-7, the Bible says, **"But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver."** There should also be the right attitude in our giving, and we should have a desire to be a blessing to others when we give. We should give because we want to, not because we have to. Our giving should produce joy within our souls, and seeing others blessed should make us grateful to God that we can be a conduit for His blessing.

Remember, it is not always about money. Money doesn't make a person spiritually wealthy any more than good deeds produce salvation. In Acts 3 when the lame man sat at the gate called Beautiful, asking for alms, he saw Peter and John walking by. He asked them for help, and in Acts 3:6, the Bible says, **"Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk."** Peter didn't have money to give him, but he still gave him something of immense value, something he would have traded all of the money in the world to receive the ability to walk!

When Blind Bartimaeus heard Jesus was coming, he screamed for Him, and continued to scream until Jesus heard. The disciples tried to shut him up, but he screamed even louder. In Mark 10:51-52, the Bible says, **"And Jesus answered and said unto him, What wilt thou that I should do unto thee? The blind man said unto him, Lord, that I might receive my sight. And Jesus said unto him, Go thy way; thy faith hath made thee whole. And immediately he received his sight, and followed Jesus in the way."** Bartimaeus didn't ask for money. He asked to see, and Christ gave that to him. When his sight was restored, he could've done anything he wanted to do, but he followed Jesus Christ.

The word "righteousness" means "virtue, or prosperity". The word "horn" is a symbol of the strength and prosperity that the righteous in the Lord walk in. The word "honour" means "weight, splendor, glory, majesty, or wealth".

In Psalm 89:16-17, the Bible says, **"In thy name shall they rejoice all the day: and in thy righteousness shall they be exalted. For thou art the glory of their strength: and in thy favour our horn shall be exalted."** It is only by the name of Jesus Christ will we ever live lives that bring glory to God, and it is by that same name that our giving has power.

In Psalm 92:10, the Bible says, **"But my horn shalt thou exalt like the horn of an unicorn: I shall be anointed with fresh oil."** When we give what God gives us to others, God enhances our own strength and prosperity in Him, and pours His Holy Spirit on us so we can walk in the Lord's power.

God's never said giving was exclusive to money, because sometimes, we don't have money to give. Sometimes, people need love, encouragement, the Word of God, healing, or a shoulder to cry on. Sometimes, the only thing we have to give is our testimony!

What are we willing to give from the prosperity God has given us? How can we bring glory to Him?

10. Psalm 112:10 - the wicked falling before the righteousness of God in Christ

Success comes with a price. We are not just speaking exclusively of financial success, but spiritual, emotional, and even relationship success. The price is having people despise you for succeeding, hating you for growing, plotting against you for crashing through the glass ceiling.

The old adage says, "Misery loves company", and when we prosper in Godliness, there will be people who will try to tear us to pieces. In the information age with social media, they seek information to use against us.

Old friends will call us "sell outs" for choosing the Lord's business over the world's business, others will try to throw the same dirt we were cleansed from upon us in an attempt to keep us in bondage, and yet still some will try to turn others against us with false reports.

They will see our success in the Lord and it will tear them apart. They won't succeed against the blessed of the Lord.

Today, we will look at Psalm 112:10, the wicked falling before the righteousness of God in Christ.

"The wicked shall see it, and be grieved; he shall gnash with his teeth, and melt away: the desire of the wicked shall perish."

The word "wicked" means "morally wrong or bad, ungodly, enemies of God". The word "grieved" means "to be troubled or angry toward righteousness." The verse begins by saying "the wicked shall see it".

What will the wicked "see"?

They will see the Godly prosper, they will see our reverence for the Lord, they will see us enjoy our relationship with the Lord, they will see our kids and the fruit of our hands blessed, they will see our light shining in the earth, they will see our kindness towards others, our generosity, our fortitude, our fearlessness, and they will see the power of the Holy Spirit moving and working in our lives.

In Luke 7:22-23, the Bible says, ***"Then Jesus answering said unto them, Go your way, and tell John what things ye have seen and heard; how that the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the gospel is preached. And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me."*** Our work in the Lord will always bear tangible fruit, and the power of the Lord will be revealed in and through us.

Christ spoke of people being offended by Him, and He also declared that people will hate us.

In Luke 6:22, Christ says, ***"Blessed are ye, when men shall hate you, and when they shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake."*** Christ aimed to change our perspective about our haters. He wants us to count ourselves as blessed and favoured by the Lord, so we pay attention to God and not the world's report. God prepared us to have the right mindset when people don't like our success.

The phrase "gnash with his teeth" means "to grind one's teeth in angry or anguish". In Luke 13:28, Christ says, **"There shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth, when ye shall see Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, and all the prophets, in the kingdom of God, and you yourselves thrust out."** The wicked are on the outside looking in, looking upon us while we experience the treasures of the kingdom of God right in front of them.

The phrase "melt away" means "to be discouraged, faint, or to become liquefied". In Psalm 37:11-13, the Bible says, **"But the meek shall inherit the earth; and shall delight themselves in the abundance of peace. The wicked plotteth against the just, and gnasheth upon him with his teeth. The LORD shall laugh at him: for he seeth that his day is coming."** One thing the prosperous in the Lord will have is peace, even as wicked attacks are centered around disrupting that peace.

The word "perish" means "to be undone, ruined, or destroyed". Even the desires the wicked have against us will be destroyed! In Proverbs 11:6-7, the Bible says, **"The righteousness of the upright shall deliver them: but transgressors shall be taken in their own naughtiness. When a wicked man dieth, his expectation shall perish: and the hope of unjust men perisheth."** No matter what attacks are launched against us, who we are in the Lord will assure us the deliverance and victory to prevail. The wicked have nothing to look forward to but failure and destruction if they don't turn their hearts to the Lord.

In Psalm 23:5, the Bible says, **"Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over."** God didn't tell us that we wouldn't have enemies, but He did assure us that He would set us before them at a table prepared for us, and pour His Spirit upon us.

A table is prepared for a guest of honor and our God is putting the enemy on notice that we are His! How can the enemy or the enemies of the cross stand against that?

He writes from the prison system that has housed his body for 21 years, but also from the place that has been the catalyst to his freedom.
